The need for guidance on licensing

Navigating the process to secure a marine licence for seaweed aquaculture has been identified as a **key challenge** by seaweed industry stakeholders.

The English Aquaculture Strategy calls for the "development of specific marine licensing guidelines for macroalgae culture that reflects its nature, scale and impact of these extractive, low trophic species" [Critical Action 1].



English Aquaculture Strategy









Aims of the guidance

- To provide clarity for both applicants and regulators of the licence, consents and authorisations required to set up, operate and decommission a seaweed farm in English marine waters.
- Focus on **information** that an applicant needs to provide to navigate the processes
- Where existing documentation is available, the guidance will signpost to relevant links and resources, rather than replicate information
- This guidance <u>does not cover</u>: the regulatory regimes relating to the sale/export of seaweed grown in aquaculture; cultivation of seaweeds in tanks or raceways on land, nor cultivation of algae in freshwater environments.












Guidelines development process

Iterative process with core team (including Defra, Cefas, MMO and NE) redrafting document after each round of reviews.

NEW AND EXPANDING MARINE SEAWEED AQUACULTURE BUSINESSES IN ENGLAND

1 SCOPING

There are multiple aspects of seaweed cultivation that require consideration by the applicant, and which will need to be clearly defined and presented when applying for a marine licence.





Determine how you want to farm









Scoping - species

Determine which species you want to farm

- Which species is best for the intended use?
- Is the species suited for the local environmental conditions?
- Is the species naturally occurring in proximity of the farm or regionally absent?
- Is the species native to the UK?
- Is the species already farmed successfully in England or the UK?







Scoping - location

Determine where you want to farm

- What are the local environmental conditions at the potential site?
- What other uses are occurring in the area?
- Is there potential for co-locating with other activities?
- Are there any MPAs present in/proximity of the area considered?
- Is the site accessible?
- Which is the nearest port?
- Is there suitable infrastructure on land?

Check:

- Suitable areas for seaweed aquaculture and MPA location in the <u>MMO marine planner</u>
- Habitats, boundaries, other uses of an area on the <u>Defra</u>
 <u>Magic website</u>
- Natural England designated sites
- For information on <u>wave height</u> around England







Pre-application

Provide information and links to: Marine Plans, Local Planning Authority, The Crown Estate open data portal, fees charged by MMO and NE, relevant contact email addresses.



? PRE-APPLICATION

This section outlines the steps which applicants are encouraged to undertake prior to making their formal application for a marine licence, and, if required, seeking planning permission, and a lease from The Crown Estate or relevant landowner.

Ensure compatibility with:

- Marine plans
- · Marine Protected Area designations
- Local plans

Consider other sea users

- · Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority
- · Other individuals

Engage with regulatory bodies:

- Marine Management Organisation
- Local planning authority
- Navigation authorities
- The Crown Estate or landowner
- Natural England

Complete a Navigation Risk Assessment











Application

Provide information and links to: marine licence application form, timeline, and MMO fee; The Crown Estate lease; authorisation to farm non-native or locally absent species.











Next step - Publication



- Reviews completed
- Currently finalising guidelines
- Publication on Seafish
 between end November mid
 December 2023
- Advertised widely
